LAW RELATED TO DIVORCE WHICH MAY BE OF INTEREST BY MIRIAM MASON

In 1988, the legislature passed several new laws which dramatically changed parties' rights at the time of divorce. One of them delineated the criteria a trial court is to consider in making an equitable distribution (or division) of the marital assets and liabilities. It also defined what a marital asset and a non-marital asset is. It did not specify that marital assets are to be divided 50/50. In fact, the Statute gives the trial judge the authority to distribute between the parties the marital assets and liabilities in such proportion as is equitable. The problem continues to be that equitable is in the eyes of the beholder.

Tampa is within the Second District Court of Appeals. There are five district courts. Two Districts hold that the starting point in any equitable distribution should be 50/50 to each party. The Second District is not one of those two. This allows for greatly disparate rulings.

The new equitable distribution statute made an important change. It is now the law that if real estate is in joint names, it is presumed to be marital property. In other words, if you own real estate at the time of the marriage which you acquired through separate funds, and then put that property into joint names, there is a presumption that it is marital. Potentially, upon a divorce, your spouse would receive 50% of that asset which you acquired prior to the marriage.

After the court makes equitable an distribution, the court considers whether or not a party should receive alimony. There are various criteria for consideration, one of which is the adultery of either spouse and the circumstances Previously, it was only the adultery of thereof. the party seeking alimony that was an initial consideration. If a party sought alimony, the payor spouse could use as a defense the fact that the payee had committed adultery. This was usually the woman - but the man's adultery was not considered in the Statutes. Currently, either spouse's adultery is a permissible consideration. There have been no cases interpreting this new Most lawyers believe that adultery will statute. only be a real consideration if there are financial issues directly caused by or related to the adultery.

FOR YOUR INFORMATION	In 1987, Florida legislated child support guidelines. this is a fill-in-the-blank formulation of child support. Income and deductions therefrom as delineated in the Statute are taken into account. The guidelines apply only to couples with a combined net income of \$50,000 or less. If the combined monthly available income was \$4,200, the total child support paid by both parties would be \$817; if \$500 it would be \$48. There is some movement to create alimony guidelines. There are various committees working on this now.







BOARD MINUTES The Tampa Club







	A lowkey romance between two reporters, one from the Marlinsport Tribune and the other from the New Seville Times, rounds out the story.

This month's book review is by Dore Beach.
The Type E Woman: How to Overcome the Stress of
Being Everything to Everybody by Harriet B. Braiker, Ph.D. Dodd, Mead and Company, 274 pages. Available in hardcover and paperback.
If you are a woman who tries to be everything to everybody, this is a <u>must</u> read book because you have become a victim of your own success (sounds like most Athena members to me!). The author (a recovering Type E) is extremely qualified to address the subject. She received her Ph.D. in Social and Clinical Psychology from UCLA and subsequently worked for the Rand Corporation.
Included in the text is a Type E stress inventory to help you take stock of your ways of thinking about stress as well as your typical stress habits and patterns. Also included is a chapter with exercises and tactics for reducing Type E stress and building stress resistance.
The value of this book lies in the contribution it makes to the understanding of women's unique diffi- culties in adapting to the demands of a male-designed workplace.






