This space is not sufficient to begin to adequately recognize Alice's contribution (including, of course, great Athena parties), but I thought it an opportunity to remind that each of us can change the world every day in our jobs, homes and organizations. I am thankful for Alice's life and example.

As an editor, she has always stressed covering communities in a broad, balanced way noting that "I want us to cover the things that aren't working, but I also want us to write about the things that are." A native of Tennessee, she comes to Tampa from The Poynter Institute in St. Petersburg where she was the Dean of Faculty.

This opportunity seems like a good time to Report To The Membership on our accomplishments for the year. All of our efforts were grounded in our roots and our mission of promoting equality and opportunity for women and they also satisfied some of the diverse interests of our membership.

You could feel the buzz in the air at the start of the year when **Paddy Moses** chaired the best attended Retreat we've ever had. The combination of the Ritz location, the great program and the size of the group energized our year's agenda from the start.

Our programs, under the direction of **Judy Munson**, reflected the vibrance of our community. We heard from community leaders about the beginnings of a creative economy, the implementation of a livable community, the turnaround of Tampa's eponymous university, the shift in our newspaper's editorial emphasis, the call to action on the Equal Rights Amendment, and, from our own authors, two book signings and how to publish without perishing. It was a terrific lineup that was always inspiring.

Based upon the Long Range Planning survey conducted last year, one of our goals this year was to determine if a Political Action Committee would be appropriate for Athena to form in order to politically support our Position Statements. **Suzy McLain** headed up a committee that studied the issue and then recommended that a PAC not be part of our organization.

The LRP survey also indicated the desire by the majority of our membership to convene a conference with a nationally recognized speaker. Policies were written, a committee under the leadership of **Helen Gordon Davis** was assembled and they set about getting this done. As the committee worked it became obvious that there were detail questions that had not been addressed in the procedure and there were several different interpretations of what the direction and purpose of the effort were to be. Consequently, in spite of some great work by Helen and her committee, it was decided to postpone continuing until clarification could be provided. That effort will be begin this summer.

Another goal indicated by the LRP survey was to address the concern of Athena maintaining a vibrant, intergenerational membership to ensure our longevity as an organization. The membership was fairly evenly divided on how best to accomplish this, so developing a solution was a challenge. The Board thinks our proposed bylaw changes will do it and hope you will, too. The recommendation was the result of a discussion among 18 of Athena's past presidents, which was another new initiative: the convening of a Past Presidents Advisory Council.

Suzy McLain once again took a leadership role by convening this group. They decided to meet quarterly to renew acquaintances, discuss current issues concerning Athena, share ideas on how to improve the organization, and advise the current President as requested. It has been a huge success and their unique perspective and wise counsel have been invaluable to me and, I think, to Athena. This will now be a continuing tradition.

Another goal was to grow the Community Foundation Athena Education Fund. This fund was established eight years ago, but had languished without a campaign to raise the level of endowment. **Marva Crenshaw** spearheaded the effort to revitalize our interest and level of commitment to this effort and, WOW, we did it. We added \$12,000 to the fund this year, increasing it by 35%. Great job!

Our three Athena Bonuses were delightfully hosted by **Dena Leavengood, Renee Williams** and **Moira Burke** and attended by a diverse and different group each time. Perfect!

The Public Issues Committee joined forces with the Community Action Committee and decided to enhance their mission by providing timely reports to the membership on issues circulating in our community. True to form, chairs **Jean Amuso** and **Louise Thompson** lent innovation to these long-standing, important committees.

Two other committees in that category performed their usual effective behind-the-scenes labor and gave us the opportunity to grant career assistance to three striving women and honor twelve Young Women of Promise. Marva Crenshaw, Sylvia Richardson and their teams continued these traditions superbly. In addition, Leslie Stein took up the challenge of *continued on page 4*

I know, I know. The word "failure" is not permitted in today's enlightened lexicon, but please permit a bit of contrariness from someone old enough to believe that self-esteem is not granted but earned and that no matter what anyone says, when you don't succeed it is not a pleasant feeling. I could not resist this quote after paying attention to what was being said at our March meeting.

Ellen Kimmel was articulate as always about the how and why of her championing pay equity at USF. While she and others admittedly took their eye off the ball after believing the situation would be rectified, when they discovered some thirty years later that this was not the case, they resumed the fight with renewed enthusiasm. If we have learned nothing else in the fight for women's rights, we have learned that we must be ever vigilant to the erosion of hard won freedoms. Monies can disappear, laws can change and judges can interpret laws differently.

Pat Frank gave us a chronology of efforts to get the ERA Amendment ratified in Florida. For those of us who either were not living here or were not politically active in the 70's it was a real eyeopener. What a treasure of information Pat has. The blow by blow, year by year, efforts and near misses were heartbreaking to hear about, much less live through. And yet, the enthusiasm remains. Jan Setzekorn of the Equal Rights Alliance gave us an update on current efforts to get the three remaining required states to ratify the ERA. While is does not look as though this will be a pivotal topic in Florida legislature this year because everyone's attention appears to be on the election, it is still a good time to discuss it with your legislators so that it can be a pivotal topic when the timing is a bit better. I'm sure we can count on **Arthenia Joyner's** enthusiasm to continue until this fight is won.

Thanks to all of our speakers and to **Louise Thompson** and the Community Action Committee for facilitating this presentation on one of our core beliefs. Another avenue of helping other women has long been our ability to use the Athena Community Foundation endowment to annually assist a few select women in need of a hand up. We were all impressed with the grit and self-determination the two selected this year have shown and were delighted to offer whatever help we can on their road to a better life. Our gratitude goes to the whole Community Foundation Committee for continuing this wonderful tradition.

This month the Community Foundation will again be the focus when we award the \$10,000 Athena Philanthropy in Action grant. Hope to see you there.



Rosemary will give us a history of her return to Tampa, discuss her goals for the editorial page and close it out with a Q&A segment. Join us for a stimulating program!





The information below represents 90% of the returned surveys. To get an idea of what's behind the numbers, at the June meeting members will have an opportunity to read all of the comments.





Athena – Past, Present and Future

When **Marva Crenshaw** asked me to jot down a few thoughts about Athena, I thought it would be an easy task, but it has turned out to more difficult than I imagined. When I think about our beginnings, the memories come flooding back and it's difficult to select those that would be the most meaningful to current members. The times were so different then. Professional women were practically invisible in Tampa. Our first task was to find each other among all the men in the pinstriped suits. We did find each other, and began to understand how desperate we were to discover soul mates in the battle for professional success. Our beginnings were all about fomenting a unified voice for the frustrated few who believed in the dream of equality. Our goal was to achieve a face and a voice for working women. One that would say, "We're here, we're smart, and we want to take our rightful place at the boardroom table with those in power." Power was a word that permeated our initial meetings. We wanted women in a place where their decisions would matter.

As Athena matured and the years flew by, many of those early goals were achieved. We may have even exceeded our most optimistic expectations. Our members were appointed and elected to important governmental positions. They reached powerful positions in banks, law firms, universities and professional organizations. Athena became the source and the cheerleading section for *a* whole host of successful women. Our membership supported and nurtured each other and becam, a symbol of what smart women could achieve when they combined their strengths.

A side benefit to our efforts, one that we really didn't anticipate, was the formation of enduring friendships. (I can still hear **Nancy Ford** at particularly acrimonious early meetings saying, "Friendship? I'm not here for that, I already have a lot of friends.") But our personal lives did become entwined with our professional goals, and we were all enriched by this unexpected phenomenon.

And the future? Maybe we have become a little too comfortable and a little too complacent. After all, we have come a long way baby! But we still haven't reached the summit. Remember, our original goal was the passage of the Equal Rights Amendment. The ERA may be a bit moribund, but it's not dead yet. Only three states need to come over from the dark side, including Florida, to make it into the Constitution. Our right to a safe, legal abortion is slowly being eroded and may disappear with the next appointment to the Supreme Court, while sexual harassment and discrimination in the workplace have yet to be eradicated. In addition, our political successes on the local level have certainly not been replicated in Washington.

So let's not get too comfortable with our own success. We have a wonderful, intelligent and feisty group of women in Athena. We should continue to use our resources to push and prod our way up to the next precipice. Apathy, thy name is <u>not</u> Athena!

A "First Person" Story

(Editor's note: Susan Dellinger, the last presenter at the November meeting, regaled the group with her memories but - alas - ran out of time. This vital segment was left unsaid so we are happy to include it for your reading pleasure.)

In 1977, Athena President, **Suzy McLain**, proposed to her board of directors the idea of Athena "special interest groups." There were many new members and the organization was growing. It needed some forum (beyond the monthly meetings) for members to become better acquainted. The idea of special interest groups was similar to the Athena "Bonus" concept of today.

The board set up several special interest groups, re: tennis, golf, trivial pursuit and BRIDGE. This was how the Athena Bridge Club was formed. Vice President **Susan Dellinger** accepted responsibility for setting up this group. Some of the original members included **Candy Olson**, **Barbara Pankau**, **Margaret Fisher**, **Mary Taylor**, **Suzy McLain**, **Ruth Kinsolving**, **Virginia Gregory**, and **Lee Leavengood**. The club met on Friday evenings after work. The wine flowed and the early group was more a "social group" than a serious bridge club. Many friendships were formed in this early group.

As Athena grew, more members joined the Athena Bridge Club. With growth came formality. The Club grew to 3 tables (12 women) and began to meet on Sunday afternoons at member's homes. 


President's Message





President's Message



The Foundation Committee reviewed 13 candidates for scholarships and selected six for final interviews. Of the six, three were chosen to receive awards of \$800 each. Those selected were:

Ellen Dux, a full time nursing student at HCC who will finish her RN program this year with a 4.0 GPA. She is a single mother with a 13-year-old daughter, works part time, rarely receives child support and lives on an income of \$832 per month.

Betty Valentine is also a full time nursing student at HCC who will graduate as an RN. She works part time and is the mother of two. She has an income of \$1,000 per month and receives no child support.

Monica Scott is a single mother with three children, one of whom is autistic. She is seeking her AA in Business Administration and will continue her studies at USF to receive her bachelor's degree in accounting. Her goal is to eventually become a CPA and have her office in her home. Care for her one child who requires a great deal of attention has proven to be extremely difficult.

These women all displayed great motivation, tenacity and strength. Those of us on the committee wondered if we could do what they are doing. Their hardships are many but their determination is strong. They all care very much about their children's current and future well being, and it's obvious they are wonderful role models.

Our Athena Foundation fund, started five years ago with \$20,000, today is at \$35,727. We are proud of our growth and we are going to make every effort to help this fund continue to grow. We can give away 7% of our income annually so the more we have,the more we can give. This year we are giving \$2400. Please remember our foundation when you are doing recognitions, birthday, holidays or gifts for any reason.





For example, our January meeting highlighted the Islam religion without offering support o. it. It was not our desire to offend our Christian, Jewish, Hindu or atheist members. The incidents surrounding September 11 guided us to becoming more aware of their beliefs. Good judgment must rule when we put together these programs. If we have failed, I apologize. It isn't easy, but we are trying.

Please welcome Linda Fries to the board. She will fill the remainder of Nancy Ford's term and will serve as the liaison to the History of Women in Tampa Book Committee. Linda is currently our Historian.

IN MEMORIAM Nancy Torbett Ford 1927 - 2001

(Editor's note: The following excerpt is from the eulogy delivered by by Linda Hanna on November 28 at the Palma Ceia Methodist Church.)

Nancy Ford was a person of many gifts. She had enormous energy, great intellect and vision, an engaging personality and leadership ability the like of which I have not seen equaled. She had great and imposing personal presence but her sweet, almost shy, smile belied all of that personal power which intimidated many when they first met her. And that smile reflected the very sensitive person Nancy was beneath her regal appearance.

Nancy made great use of all of her gifts. The newspaper articles and announcements have covered the facts about Nancy's work and accomplishments, leaving no question about the breadth and heft of them.

Nancy was thoroughly engaged with her world. There was nothing which didn't interest her - to her, issues were challenges, puzzles to be solved through the application of her active intellect and energy and with the help of her ever-expanding circle of friends and associates.

Nancy would have been a leader anywhere, in any arena, but she chose to bloom where she was planted, firmly, here in Tampa where she never lived more than five miles from her birthplace except for a short while she spent in Atlanta when she and Buddy were first married and where CJo was born. Her loyal dedication to this place has been the great good fortune of Tampa, its arts community, its business community, the University of South Florida and, most of all, it has been the great good fortune of all of us, her business associates, her friends and her family.

But, Nancy could not have thrown herself into all that she did were she not a partner in a great love story. She and Buddy were married for 51 years and he was right with her and supported her in all the projects she tackled. Handsome and charming, Buddy was always there to talk things over with, to get away to see the autumn color with, to go antiquing with. Along the way they were blessed with daughters CJo and Charlton who brought them the absolute delight of their three grandchildren. A pillow on display in their house tells their story, "Happiness is being married to your best friend."

When Nancy's class of 1948 at her beloved Randolph-Macon Woman's College held its 50th reunion, in 1998, she wrote about her life, and I want to read to you excerpts from that page in the reunion booklet, in Nancy's own words:

"Nowadays, I enjoy a fairly peaceful existence with my husband, Buddy, living in a townhouse on Hillsborough Bay in Tampa. Our elder daughter, C.Jo, lives nearby with her son, Ford. Our daughter, Charlton, lives in Mobile, Alabama, with a daughter, Genevieve, and a son, Sean Michael. These children are, of course, the world's first perfect people.

I retired from the public relations and development fields several years ago (praises be!), and now every day is Saturday.

Of all the volunteering I have done, the most satisfactory was working on behalf of women. I helped found and served as president of the Athena Society and the Florida Women's Alliance, both still going strong after 20 years. These networking groups have the common purposes of supporting women and working to ensure their rights; I also served as president of The International Alliance, now an organization linking women's networks throughout the world.

My years at Randolph-Macon prepared me well for the life I have described. As well as an excellent education, the College gave me confidence, leadership and volunteer opportunities plus the firm belief that women can accomplish anything they want or need to do."

Did You Know?

(Editor's note: In an effort to get to know each other better, this is #2 in a series being featured in each newsletter during the current year. **Patti Breckenridge** is doing the writeups and welcomes your input.)

Did you know that one Athena member was a monkey watcher while in college?

A professor nicknamed "Mr. Walrus" tipped her off to a research opportunity. One thing led to another and she ended up doing field research at a primate colony off the coast of Puerto Rico. She also conducted a site search for National Institutes of Health breeding sites in coastal South Carolina. Not surprisingly, she was an adviser to the Darwin Society in the 1970s.

Her most amusing finding: That the 125 monkeys she followed each day had not read the scientific literature. In other words, she discovered some things no one previously had spotted. At first, she was studying their play behavior. Then she started to notice how they all cared for the babies among them - not just the mothers. All of the monkeys - male and female, young and old - participated in "parental care."

Do you know whom this Athena member is?

Maybe her take on how she applies lessons from her days as a monkey watcher to her current life will reveal her identity: "The current most important function of this took kit seems to be keeping my husband eternally amused in any crowded room." But the lessons are valuable to her current career as well: "Groups are important. Family is important. Loved ones are important. Firefighters are an amazing group. They are a unique family that cares about the world in a way that would be foreign to many."

You must have guessed who she is by now. If not, here are a few more clues:

She has a great sense of humor. When asked how her career veered from its anthropological course, she said, "I was exploring field opportunities when my father had a serious stroke, my grandmother was trying to live to be 100, my mother was in ill health, and my niece was adrift without my father in her life. So 22 years ago, I came back to Tampa for a year to fix it all." And never left.

She served as Conservation Coordinator at Busch Gardens for 10 years and later worked for the Department of Education and for then-Sen. Helen Gordon Davis.

Yes, you guessed it! We're talking about **Judith Breuggeman**, who now is Special Assistant to the Chief for the Tampa Fire Rescue Department. She traveled an interesting road from her days as a primate researcher to her current role as public servant. Both require a lot of careful observation!

Cookbook Launch – November 29

(Editor's note: Have you ever been curious about the genesis of a cookbook? Following my inquiry to Sandy, this was her intriguing reply.)

Last year I decided to put down some of my recipes for my kids because they were always calling for things that I had made when they were young or when they had been over for dinner. They all cook, so I figured I'd put down twenty or so and surprise them with looseleaf albums of recipes. It turned into a four or five month project (took much longer because I'm almost computer illiterate) that is well over 100 recipes and 130 pages and became somewhat of a memoir because I included personal recollections about each one. It was really surprisingly rewarding to do and really appreciated by them.

Afterwards I called the Tribune food editor to tell her she should recommend this kind of a project to her readers; she did a story with recipes and pictures. Then I talked with a publisher and this is the result. Most of the personal reflections are out. It's called "Specialities of the House" (easy recipes for people on the go). Costs \$14.95 and will be in most of the area bookstores; book signings are scheduled in a number of different venues.

P.S. The kids still call for the same recipes because they generally can't find their books. And my two oldest grandchildren have even made some of the recipes.





Education Fund

The Athena Society Education Foundation has initiated the scholarship process for the new year. This will be the third year of giving money to deserving women who have financial needs relative to furthering their education.

We had more than 60 applications the first year. Last year we had 47. We feel we will have at least that many again this year. It is very difficult to whittle these mostly very deserving women down to three. We have given away approximately \$4,000. Our fund balance as of June 30, 2001 is \$29,326.30. We can give up to 7% of our funds each year. The larger the fund balance the more scholarship money we can give.

The Education Committee is made up of five past presidents: **Susan Bucklew, Linda Fries, Suzy McLain, Judy Munson** and me. Information and applications are sent to various resources in our community, i.e., Hillsborough Community College, The Spring, Centre for Women, Leary, Erwin, Alpha House. The money can be used for whatever the women need to continue their education: day care, transportation, books, tuition, etc. An application must be submitted which includes a cover letter stating why they should receive a scholarship and a statement of plans relating to educational and career objectives and future goals. We require a copy of the previous year's incomtax return and two letters of recommendation.

Athena now has a very tangible way of helping other women. We encourage our members to remember Athena's Education Foundation when making a gift for someone's birthday, anniversary or other special day. The more our fund grows, the more women we can help and that is what Athena is all about.

We are delighted to welcome back to Tampa and to Athena a former president (1992-93) and very special lady: **Juel Smith**. Juel has been in Nashville for the past two years with her husband, Dr. John Smith, who served as president of Fisk University. They both are thrilled to be home and already are involved in many of the activities they left behind. Again...welcome back!




